


THE

- I've been doing this for fifteen years, and I'm good at both shooting and running a business






AMIAN ARTIST?

- I never thought so
- I figured I was a businessperson in photography, not a photographer in business
- I liked weddings, but never OMG LOVED LOVE
- I never got nervous or excited about weddings
- l always figured it was just a job
- ...and that's okay!

EVERYONE IS DOING IT

- Everyone talked about the personal projects they did to alleviate the stress of work
- Work didn't stress me out, because it was just my job
- ▶ I didn't feel like I needed the creative outlet. I'm not an artist, remember?
- The thought of doing a personal project just felt like more work
- ...That I wasn't getting paid for
- What was the point anyhow?





WHO HAS TIME FOR THIS?

- I was building my business
- I was making sure my business was stable
- I was moving my business across the country
- l was raising my kids
- I didn't have time to spend away from work
- I could have prioritized it, but it wasn't my priority. I didn't NEED it!

ITRIED ANYHOW

- Street photography
- Landscape photography
- Children's portraits began as a project, ended up being part of my business
- Theatre photography for community theaters sparked something, but not much
- Day in the life family photography felt like work
- I took cameras on vacations and didn't shoot





WORK BECAME TOO MUCH

- Weddings started weighing heavily on me in my thirteenth year of business
- I thought about branching into boudoir, going as far as getting a studio...and stopping
- The only joy I got outside of work was photographing my kids
- I kept wracking my brain to find a personal project
- Then I realized I was making it a JOB

- My kids...but I want to respect their privacy
- My husband...but again with the privacy thing
- ► I love TV and movies, but I don't want to make them. I like looking at the light, which is also what I like about photography

- Live theatre, which brings together emotion and light and all the great parts of weddings










WHAT'S HAPPENING?

- l'm creating just for myself
- No one is paying me, so there are no expectations
- I can come up with concepts and pitch them
- I'm starting to see a direction
- I'm still not sure what it means, but I'm happy
- For once, I'm not thinking "How can this be a career move?"



WHY THIS?

- I had to be moved to action
- If I'm working for free, it needs to do something for me
- If you're not moved to do a project, you just haven't found what moves you
- Don't force it or it won't work.
- b ...but at some point, quit making excuses and do it
- Only listen to yourself. No one else.





WHY NOW?

- My business was established
- I had money to get me through the year
- ▶ I had advertising money that I chose to allocate into funding this project
- It's like starting a new business it's not free, and the money had to come from somewhere
- You also have to find the time and be willing to dedicate that time to the project



WHERE DO YOU START?

- Are you working with people? You're going to need to reach out
- A model call via social media...unless you want specific people
- How do you ask? Just ask!
- Be prepared for rejection
- Be honest about what you're shooting
- What's in it for them?

WHAT TO EXPECT

- Cancellations....lots of cancellations
- A lot of people saying "Why are you doing that, anyhow?"
- A lot of people saying "How will this be profitable?"
- The endeavor might COST you money
- It also might turn into something you don't expect



















WHAT IS HAPPENING?

- Suddenly I love studio lights
- Suddenly I am turning to the studio and away from natural light
- Suddenly I have a newly voracious appetite for theatre, which makes me a happier person
- Suddenly I want to take pictures all the time
- Suddenly I'm making contacts I'd never have made before
- Where is this going? Who cares?



UNEXPECTED SIDE EFFECT...

- I met great people
- Don't underestimate how meeting great people can change you and improve your mood
- I was out in the world interacting, not sitting behind the computer
- I was a collaborator, not a worker for hire. This was huge, and an enormous morale booster
- I was creating with people, not trying to force creation
- I looked forward to work





UNEXPECTED SIDE EFFECT...

- I learned new ways to engage with my subjects while collaborating
- Those skills spilled over into my wedding work
- My wedding work started to get better
- I started seeing joy in people, instead of seeing people as jobs
- I valued my work more. Sometimes I am a photographer for hire. Sometimes that's okay!
- I valued myself more









WHAT IF NOTHING CALLS TO ME?

DON'T FORCE IT

- This isn't a job. This isn't going to the gym. You don't have to force yourself to do it because it's good for you. It's not kale!
- Go out and live your life. Love people. Have hobbies. Stop caring about whether you are or aren't an artist
- Learn everything about everything. Read books. Listen to other people speak. Watch the news. Turn off the news. Go to the movies. Learn because you love learning.
- When a little spark touches you, grab it and follow it
